Sadly we have lost two more of our number and we send our condolences to Carolyn Wilde for the loss of John and to Jane and Jo Williams for the loss of Paul.



Although the oaks have yet to break leaf, primroses and wild daffodils have been flowering along the public footpath and bluebells are beginning to turn the ground blue.

RVCBS invited the Shropshire Council 'Wild Team' to help with conservation work on the quillet. We wanted to open up the canopy at the top of the steps to let in more light for plants to flourish. The 'Wild Team' has visited five times since November and they have taken down one or two trees. Residents may have heard the noisy banter of a chain-saw on occasions.

We have also been maintaining the steps on the quillet and putting up more bird boxes supplied by Bishops Castle Community College BTEC students. A grant from the AONB has part funded recent work to install a deer ex-closure to help conserve hazel coppice and encourage other ground flora. More about that at the Woodland Fair!

Fast Broadband now in the Redlake


We are delighted to report that several households in the upper Redlake valley are now connected and going live with the new fast wireless broadband service provided by Secure Web Services (SWS).

Further households will be connected in the next few weeks (those within direct line of sight of the mast now at Garn Farm). Those who wish to be connected but are not in line of sight of the mast will be dealt with very soon we hope.

If any household in the upper Redlake - including Pentre, Hobarris, New Invention, Purlogue, Treverward and Pen y Wern - wishes to receive a fast wireless broadband service and has not yet expressed an interest, please contact SWS on 0333 7000 227. Broadband vouchers are still available to cover the cost of installation.

Chapel Lawn Broadband Update

After prolonged negotiations with BT and Shropshire Council, contracts were finally signed to install Superfast



Broadband up the valley from Bucknell to Chapel Lawn. The scheme will provide "fibre to premise" for 20 properties and "fibre to cabinet" to a further 16 properties. The success of the application was achieved by residents applying for, and getting, 28 Basic Broadband Subsidies between them!

BT are contractually obliged to complete the work no later than March 2018, however it is hoped work will start shortly.

Hodre Pond

You should have received a flyer about the pond at the end of February. In early March a small group of Redlake residents met Fiona Gomersall (Shropshire Wildlife Trust) and John Clayfield, both botanists, to look at how best to care for this important pond in the future. We did a little bit of pondweed removal but as it was almost spawning time, we were to leave further weed clearance until next winter. Fiona and John will produce a plant list for the pond in the summer and hopefully with gentle management over time, the pond's biodiversity will increase.

OBITUARY: Doug Stead



Douglas Stead died in an accident in November 2016. This profile is taken from the obituary prepared by friend of the family Rachael Morris. Doug was born in Clun in 1951 he was the fourth of seven children and the family lived at this time at the Ridings, Church Bank, Clun. 1967 they moved to the Lye (now called Rose Heart Kingdom). This is where Doug spent his childhood. He attended Chapel Lawn School and later Knighton Senior School. School wasn't Doug's favourite occupation and it was no surprise that he could often be found up to some sort of mischief, not least when he and his friends Bernard Evans and Jim Didalick painted white dots all over the headmasters brand new car!

Doug was happiest at home, hurtling down hill in tractor tyres with his siblings or on sheets of corrugated tin in the snow with only the hedge at the bottom to act as a brake. One evening after hearing his father Cliff telling his mother that he had ordered a new set of harrows to get rid of the mole tumps, Doug decided to help his father and recruited his brother John to help him after school the next day by doing some harrowing. Later that evening their neighbour Grimes rang the Steads to say she had seen Cliff's landrover going madly round the field with no driver. Cliff ran out to see his brand new 12ft harrows which the boys had driven through the 10ft gate imagine the scene!

Even at this young age Doug was a

talented mechanic and when given their first car by Pete and Beryl Sharp, towed it back to the Lye with an engine full of sand and round the back of the house. He stripped it down and rebuilt it, having it up and running by next morning.

Doug had a logical brain and could just see how things fit together; he could turn a box of bits into a fully functioning piece of equipment. However, to quote John Tranter "you could beg Doug to fix something and he would be too busy, but turn your back for 5 minutes and he would have it done". Doug's love of driving led him to become involved in Autograss racing when it was known as bed steading. His first car was a mini and he then moved into 'specials'. As always Doug made them from whatever he could get his hands on, the only new part of his 'special' being the steering joint. When he wasn't racing himself he was always keeping others on track with his generosity and mechanical ability. Bruce Campbell on one occasion blew his engine in practice and Doug solved the problem by removing the Ford engine from his road car, a Morris 1000 pickup, fitting it into Bruce's race car and then swapping it back after the meeting so he could drive home.

Always being full of fun, the story goes that no one ever got one over on Ivor Williams except Doug! One day Doug turned up at James Middleton's to do some lime spreading, Ivor (Dukins) being helpful, opened the gate for him and trapped himself behind the gate. As Doug passed through into the field he turned on the spinner covered Dukins in lime!!!

Doug had a love of animals and many people will remember his faithful dog Toby who was never far from his side. He also had an affinity with horses having learned to ride at Lye and competed at the Teme Valley pony club winning many prizes on his pony Su.

Although many people would not know that Doug was a good horse man, he never lost his skill with them. One day, coming across the Tranters who had just taken delivery of a new horse, he discovered that they were nervous of trying it out being unsure of its temperament. Doug jumped onto the horse, dashed off towards the Garn and back, jumped off and told them it was OK. Doug met his wife Margaret in 1971 and they married in 1973and in August that year their first son Matthew was born. Mr and Mrs Stead lived in Brampton Bryan until 1975 when they moved to Guilden Down. In March of that year their daughter Clare was born. In 1983 the family moved to Newcastle on Doug Clun. worked throughout these years and became well known in Herefordshire, Powis and Shropshire, harrowing and lime spreading. It's hard to see who will keep the hillsides in good order now that he is gone.

Doug's family had grown over the years and he was very proud of his grandchildren Kieran, Daniel. Callum, Seth and Eli. Doug loved his time with his family spending holidays in Ireland and Bulgaria. He especially enjoyed watching Kieran and Daniel Autograss racing. He packed a lot into his last year visiting Ireland with the whole family in March, the Dorset steam rally with Margaret, and on 15th October for his 65th birthday he did the Snowdonia Zipwire with Matthew.

Doug wasn't materialistic, he believed time well spent was more important than money and that upcycling was the way forward. He had a quiet way with things whether people, dogs, horses or engines; he was witty, funny and would help anyone in need, his whole family are incredibly proud of him and their only regret is that they were unable to tell him this, especially Margaret who was unable to say goodbye.

Seasonal Gardening Notes



Lily of the valley has delicate bell flowers, the most delicious scent and a will of iron. Where it is content nothing will stop its progress, but many people find it will not grow at all for them.

I have read of success where the normally horizontally placed roots are buried vertically; also where the roots are simply laid on the surface of the soil and then ignored. It is also suggested that they should be planted to the south of where you actually want them to grow, as they invariably march northwards. They woodland plants, favouring damp, shady leaf mould, but the best plants I ever saw were growing in a sunbaked, ant-infested gravel drive; worth trying then, in any situation in your garden.

There are several different forms now with flowers that are pink or double like tiny roses and with leaves edged or striped with gold, or 'giant' forms that stand a whopping 10 inches tall. All are perfectly beautiful and just one flower stem will scent a room.
